ATTACHMENT 1 GUIDELINES FOR REFERRAL OF DEVELOPMENT APPLICATIONS TO COUNCIL AND INDEPENDENT ASSESSMENT OF DEVELOPMENT APPLICATIONS

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Part A – Circumstances Where Development Applications Should be Referred to Council for Determination

Generally Council should be involved in the determination of applications which:

- are not able to be delegated.
- have significant environmental, social or economic impacts;
- are of significant monetary value;
- result in significant issues that relate to the public interest; or
- result in creating a significant variation to a Council policy or stance.
- may result in a real or perceived conflict of interest.

Having regard to the above following types of development applications should be referred to Council.

- 1. Where there are legislative requirements which require the application to be dealt with by Council eg. certain buildings on Community Land (section 47E and 377 of the Local Government Act 1993).
- 2. Where the application is for a major development exceeding \$5 million in value.
- 3. Where the application is for a major subdivision exceeding 50 or more lots.
- 4. Where the application is for a Designated Development.
- 5. Where the application is for the demolition of any building listed as a Heritage Item and the QPRC Heritage Advisory Committee is not supportive of the demolition.
- 6. Where concurrence is required by a referral authority and that authority will not issue that concurrence.
- 7. Where the application involves a significant variation to a requirement in a development control plan and that variation would have a significant environmental impact or where a variation of development standards is sought under the provisions of Clause 4.6 of a Local Environmental Plan or SEPP 1.
- 8. Where written submissions are made to Council resulting from the notification of a development application and valid concerns have been raised which cannot be overcome with a condition of consent and where submissions relate to substantial adverse material impact and where plans cannot or will not be amended to overcome such concerns.
- 9. Where the development application is requested to be referred to Council by specific resolution.
- 10. Any other application as determined by the CEO or General Manager Natural and Built Character where they may consider the application to be significant, result in policy implications or is in the public interest.
- 11. Where the applicant is a Councillor, a member of the Executive staff (CEO and Portfolio General Managers) or a staff member of the Development Service.

Part B – Guidelines for Circumstances under which Development Applications should be Independently Assessed.

Generally Independent assessment of development applications should be required where:

- Council is the owner of the land and proposes to develop the land for a purpose which would be in competition with other commercial business; or
- Council is the owner of the land and the sale of the land is dependent on the approval of a development application, or
- Council stands to gain financially as a result of the decision in respect of a development application.

Where such situations arise the following guidance is recommended:

- 1. An independent Town Planning assessing officer shall be through the services of a suitably qualified consultant Town Planner. The appointment of an independent assessing officer shall be arranged by the Service Manager Development with the approval of the Portfolio General Manager.
- 2. A Town Planning Officer from within Council's Development Branch shall be nominated as the coordinating officer.
- 3. The appointed independent assessing officer shall be consulted regarding the level of public notification required for the development application. The coordinating officer will undertake the notification and exhibition of the development application in accordance with the independent assessing officer's instructions.
- 4. All requests from the independent assessing officer for further information, plans etc. are to be followed up by the coordinating officer and documentation received is to be immediately forwarded to the independent assessing officer by the coordinating officer.
- 5. The development application shall be available for public inspection in Council offices.
- 6. All submissions are to be forwarded to Council's Development Branch. The Town Planning officer appointed to coordinate the process shall be responsible for ensuring that all objections received are forwarded to the independent assessing officer.
- 7. Where the independent assessing officer deems it necessary to meet with the applicant or submitters, the arrangements for such a meeting shall be the responsibility of the nominated Council coordinating officer, in consultation with the independent assessing officer. The appointed coordinating officer shall sit in on the meeting as an observer.
- 8. At the end of the public notification period the coordinating officer is responsible for ensuring that the independent assessing officer has all the documentation held by Council in respect of the development application including all relevant Council policies as soon as possible, LEP's and standard conditions that are required to carry out the assessment of the application.
- 9. The independent assessing officer shall supply to Council a written report outlining his or her assessment of the application in accordance with the requirements of the E P & A Act 1979 (as amended) including a recommendation and where appropriate the conditions of consent that are deemed necessary.
- 10. The independent assessing officer's report shall be reproduced in full within the Council Agenda without alteration. Council's coordinating officer shall be responsible for ensuring that the report is included in the relevant Council Meeting agenda and for checking the report for any omissions or errors in the reproduction.
- 11. The independent assessor will be required to attend the meeting when the Council is determining the application.
- 12. Following determination of the development application the appointment of Council accredited certifiers for the purposes of issuing a construction certificate or acting as the private certifying authority shall only be permitted where it accords with the guidelines in the Building Professionals Board Act.

BUNGENDORE CBD ENHANCEMENT

1. Executive Summary of engagement report:

Consultation with the Bungendore community commenced in March 2017 to determine priorities for the enhancement of the Bungendore CBD. The consultation concluded with an online survey.

The results of the community engagement have determined the priorities for the enhancement of the Bungendore CBD and have determined selection of street furniture to include signage to the four (4) entrances into Bungendore, way finding signage for the benefit of visitors to Bungendore and the look and feel of selected street furniture such as park benches and bin enclosures, for the Bungendore township.

ENGAGEMENT

A community workshop was held in Bungendore on Thursday 9 March 2017, to determine priorities for future works in Bungendore. The results of this consultation is listed at Table 3 of this report, with feedback received from the workshop participants, with themes for changes to Bungendore, in order of priority. The workshop was advertised widely by Council's communications team, via electronic and print media.

Further consultation with individual community members and community groups were conducted by Council staff over the period from March to August 2017. The final consultation with the Bungendore residents occurred as an online survey through the QPRC web site, where respondents were asked to vote and make comment on options for entrance and wayfinding signage. The results of this survey is detailed at Figures 4 and 5 below.

DESIGN CONCEPTS

- 1. Council has engaged the consultants, "coordinate", to draft concepts for wayfinding signage, with these concepts being the subject of the online survey.
- 2. Council also engaged the services of consultant and supplier, Danthonia Design, to draft concepts for entrance signage that were also the subject of the online survey.
- 3. A proposal for entrance signage has been put forward by local Bungendore resident and business owner that was included in the online survey.
- 4. Entrance signage design, sourced by the former Palerang Council was also included. This entrance signage concept was designed by "dsb landscape architects" and was also included in the online survey.

As a result of the community engagement, Council has now received preferences regarding entrance signage, way finding signage and the style of preferred street furniture. The results are:

- 1. Option 3: Railway sleeper structure with information on it was the preferred option for way finding signage.
- 2. Option 2: modelled on railway sleeper wayfinding signage.




2. Participation in engagement:

There were approximately 60 people at the community workshop held in Bungendore on 9 March 2017, with all participants required to respond or make comment. These details are reported in item 3.1. Bungendore Workshop Main Street / CBD Beautification in this report below.

There were 265 visitors to Council's online survey tool with 46 contributors. The entire survey report is detailed at attachment 1 of this report. For further details, comments and voting, respondents were required to vote for their favourite entrance sign; favourite wayfinding sign and to make comment and select street furniture (i.e. bin enclosures and seats). Only the signage is included in the November 2017 Council report. Council staff will be procuring street furniture, i.e. seats and bin enclosures, based on community comments received, as per the online community survey and discussions held with business owners within the Bungendore CBD. It is more likely bin enclosures will be subject to artwork and seat selections will aim to complement existing former bridge timber seating.

The demographic breakdown is detailed at Figures 1 to 3 below, being connection to Queanbeyan-Palerang; age; and gender. The majority of respondents indicated they were locals, with more than 50% being ratepayers. The gender breakdown indicates the majority of respondents were predominately female, with 30 living in Bungendore and the remainder in the neighbouring towns and villages.

A mix of ages were recorded, with the highest numbers in the 36-45 age brackets.

Figure 2: Demographic Analysis – Gender




Figure 3: Demographic Analysis - Age

3. Comments received:

A report on the community workshop format held in Bungendore on 9 March is detailed at 3.1 below. The report also details the participant responses throughout the workshop and gives an overview of observations made by participant and there ranking.



The majority of the respondent comments in the online survey indicated the community preferred a mix of metal and timber products that would complement the character of Bungendore. It was clear that modern type street furniture would be out of place in Bungendore, with respondents indicating their preference for a heritage and / or artistic style street furniture.

The survey asked respondents to rank inn order of preference the options for signage. The lowest overall score is the sign that received the most preference votes, whilst the highest overall score will be the sign that received the least votes. The results indicate preferred options are:

- 3. Option 3: Railway sleeper structure with information on it was the preferred option for way finding signage. Refer table below.
- 4. Option 2: modelled on railway sleeper wayfinding signage. Refer table below.

Figure 4: Survey Response Graph – Way finding signage






Figure 5: Survey Response Graph - entrance signage

3.1. BUNGENDORE WORKSHOP MAIN STREET / CBD BEAUTIFICATION

The workshop at Bungendore held in the Council Chambers on Thursday 9 March 2017 was facilitated by external consultant Rose **Participant activity 1** - Journalist interview. Three (3) participants per team. The participants were asked to take on the role of interviewer, local person, and a visitor to Bungendore.

The brief: Participants were asked to consider Bungendore today, and report on what is good about Bungendore and what is not so good about Bungendore. The aim was to gain perspectives from a local point a view and from a visitor's point of view. Participants to write one idea or answer on a post it note and place on the three prepared butchers papers attached to one wall of the room, headed "Identity", "Qualities" and "Experiences". Each of the notes were to indicate whether answers provided were a positive or a negative point of view. Results of the activity as provided on the butchers paper has been transferred to the table below.

Participant Activity 2 - Participants were asked to remain in the same teams and to re-interview each other. This time rotating the interviewer, local person and visitor positions.

The brief: Participants were asked to interview each other again, this time from a futuristic point of view (10 years into the future), and report findings on the image of Bungendore. Respondents were asked to make comment on post it notes and place on the second set of butcher's paper. Participants were also invited to remove the negative responses (as indicated in Table 1), and turn them into a positive response and re-place the note on the second set of butcher's paper.

Participants were also reminded of the \$500,000 immediately available to Council and to consider this funding in responses. This enables Council to stage the CBD beautification in order of community priority.



After post it notes were placed on the second set of butchers paper, participants were then asked to vote with coloured dots, red indicating first and orange indicating second priority, on the participant view of the look and feel of Bungendore into the future. Results of the activity with the first and second priorities are listed in the table below, along with remaining comments not tagged (dotted):

OBSERVATIONS

Based on the feedback received from the Workshop participants, a number of recurring themes are apparent. Table 2 above has been rearranged into categories to illustrate the volume of comments to each category. Items such as the Visitor Centre, i.e. a Visitor Centre exists in Bungendore in the future have been voted on by workshop participants and appear to be of great importance.

From the priority list it is apparent that footpaths and walkways are highly apparent and considered in the futuristic Bungendore. Trees, heritage feel, signage, seats, bins and amenities also play a large role in Bungendore's future.

4. Conclusion:

As a result of the workshop, surveys and personal discussions with community groups, the overwhelming response was that Bungendore residents required a revitalised look and feel. The results of the online survey, in regard to street and wayfinding signage indicated the majority of respondents preferred the railway sleeper style options for both street signage and way finding signage. Comments received regarding street furniture indicate that modern style furniture would be out of place, preferring instead a more heritage or artistic styles.

BUNGENDORE CBD UPGRADE – Community Consultation

1. BACKGROUND

Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council, as part of the \$500,000 grant funded project to upgrade the Bungendore CBD, has recently implemented street tree planting around Bungendore. The next stage of this project is to install street furniture and upgrade walking paths within the CBD. Street furniture will entail bench or park seating, bin enclosures (to enclose a wheelie bin), and way finding signage.

Council, as part of this consultation is taking this opportunity to select entrance signage into Bungendore also, i.e. to the four entrances to the town. A selection of signage options is detailed at Appendix 2.

Notwithstanding that the Bungendore residents, business community and former Council, have undertaken extensive work and consultation on CBD streetscapes upgrades and landscaping, this consultation aims to incorporate past options and opportunities and incorporate a few new options.

EXISTING LANDSCAPE CONCEPT PLANS

The former Palerang Council adopted landscape concept plans by DSB Landscape Architects that will be used as the basis for this project.

DSB Landscape Architects have prepared a Bungendore Streetscape Implementation Guide as part of their landscape concept design, refer Appendix 1. This Guide has been consulted as the basis for materials selections for this project, Council has also researched relevant street furniture that fits into the context of the DSB Implementation Guide also. These are detailed at Appendix 2 and 3.

A set of Streetscape Guidelines for the Bungendore Town Centre has been prepared also, by local Bungendore landscape consultants, to summarise the Bungendore Streetscape Implementation Guide drawings by DSB Landscape Architects that may benefit residents when attempting to interpret the Guide. Refer report at Appendix 4 of this document.

FEEDBACK

Council is now seeking feedback from the community to select the style and type of street furniture to be implement in the streets of the Bungendore CBD. Feedback is essential for Council as a guide to providing a streetscape that is acceptable to the majority of the residents.

A selection, or examples, as mentioned above, are listed here at Appendixes 2 and 3. The focus areas for seating, bins and way finding signage will be on Gibraltar Street, Ellendon Street and Malbon Street.

Any new way finding signage will be directional indicators for community facilities and information only, e.g. toilets, cafés, art galleries, etc. They will not list actual business names.




Appendix 3: Entrance Signage - There are four (4) sign options listed on the following pages.

Indicative "B". Entrance Sign Option 1

This sign has been designed by long time local and business owner. Interpretation for this design is detailed on the next page.











Design Principles surrounding this concept style:

- Originally envisaged as tubular stainless steel. but due to cost the design is now flat steel of consistent thickness and possibly varying width
- Cortex or epoxy painted, and rolled under tension and welded to keep the shape.
- The shape would be an abstract "B" (not as the sail form in the attached image).
- The idea is to brand the village as art/craft, and the sign to be remarkable, something people will talk about.
- 5. So, to really emphasise that, the form is intended to be about 6 meters high
 - The text "Bungendore" would be inside the bottom larger part of the "B",
 - The text may appear to float when sign subjected to wind.




Entrance Sign Option 2

Danthonia 1: This style of entrance signage is based on one of the concepts of the way-finding signage, by Coordinate.



- Waterproof, insect proof, fire retardant closed cell foam, High-Density Urethane, carved and painted.
- Dent resistant, will not crack, split, swell or rot.
- Constructed from 16% recycled material
- Engineered to comply with AS1170.2, the Australian standard for wind loads, engineered to withstand a 100 year wind event
- Rust proof, hammer proof, no fading, 7 year warranty





Retro-Reflective Vinyl

This sign and Danthonia 2 signage detailed on the next page, are both readable at night, being applied with retro-reflective vinyl around the main dark add-on letters.

This is an excellent, low maintenance, low cost night time visibility option. By making only the letters reflective, you get the readability without the glare. By placing the reflective vinyl on the flat surface around the letters you get a uniform glow at night.

During the day, the reflective vinyl is almost invisible against the light background.

However, for retroreflective vinyl to work, the sign needs to be placed in a location where it will be picked out by vehicle headlights. It will not be effective when lit by an independent light source.




Entrance Sign Option 3

Appendix 4: Street Furniture – Seats and Bins (There are a number of seat and bin enclosure options listed here, by various street furniture suppliers.)

A mixture of timber seating and steel or aluminium seating has been selected for its suitability to the Bungendore streetscapes. In most cases street furniture suppliers will create styles so that seating and bin enclosures match, as can be seen in the background photo of the Victor Harbour seat pictured below at Option 1.



Seat Option 1: Victor Harbour seat by Spark Furniture (formerly Street & Park furniture). Heavy timbers used allude to thick timber pylons that support bridges and jetties. These and other samples listed here: <u>http://www.sparkfurniture.com.au/products/</u>





Seat Option 2: Rose Garden Seat, by Spark. Based on traditional wicker garden seat. Made from solid aluminium rod and water cut plate, powder coat finish. Low maintenance.







Seat Option 3: Precinct Seat and Bench by Spark. Available in oiled hardwood or wood composite. With or without a backrest.

Bin Option 1: Standard bin enclosure (by Spark) with rain shroud, powder coated (to any colour selection) zinc plated steel and stainless steel with optional ashtray.

Also available with perforated laser cut patterns.

Capacity 120L and 240L options.




Bin Option 2: Avalon Sulo Enclosure

Appendix 5: Streetscape Guidelines - Bungendore Town Centre

STREETSCAPE GUIDELINES - BUNGENDORE TOWN CENTRE

The Guidelines below summarise the "Bungendore Streetscape Implementation Guide" drawings by dsb Landscape Architects which are recommended by the s355 Bungendore Town Centre and Environs Committee of Palerang Council.

1. ELLENDON STREET (Ref.: dsb drawing 3193-D1 B Ellendon Street Streetscape)

Street function.

Ellendon Street (CBD part) is the main cross street linking Gibraltar and Malbon Streets. It has kerbside parking, some verge planting in generous grassed areas and generally narrow footpaths.

Streetscape design concept:

Design is to emphasise comfort for pedestrians with upgraded footpaths, seating areas and shade trees. It should provide an arts oriented precinct between the two different style commercial streets i.e "arts-link" precinct.

Streetscape guidelines:

Street design & paving: Existing kerb lines and parallel kerbside parking to be retained, except for new kerb 'blisters' and cobblestone paving at each end of block.

Verge treatments: to be 3m wide brick paths (recommended colour: PGH Pompeii or Chestnut) adjacent to the property line with grassed area extending to the kerb and incorporating street trees and bike racks at intervals along each side of street.

Seating/ artwork nodes: to be located adjacent to the brick path (see drawing) and to be feature-paved to distinguish them. These areas are to incorporate local or iconic artwork and information signage fixed to waist-high stone or timber plinths or as bronze plaques set in paving. Seats are to use local or iconic materials.

Street trees: existing trees in verge to be retained and additional trees planted to create a continuous canopy along the street to provide shade and shelter for pedestrians and parked cars. Recommended species: Fraxinus Oxycarpa 'Raywood' (Claret Ash).

2. MALBON STREET (Ref.: dsb drawing 3193-D2 B Malbon Street Streetscape)

Street function:

Malbon Street (Kings Highway) is the main road through the town, connecting to Braidwood and the coast. There are some significant commercial premises along the street (e.g. Woodworks Gallery, Carrington inn & conference centre, Village Centre and Caltex service station. A new supermarket is to be developed adjacent to the service station. A new roundabout is to be located at the Molonglo Street intersection.

Streetscape design concept:

Design is to facilitate vehicular through traffic but also to attract travellers to stop in Bungendore and emphasise pedestrian safety, comfort and convenience i.e. tourism precinct.

Streetscape guidelines:

Street design & paving: Existing kerb lines and parallel kerbside parking to be retained, including new pedestrian refuges at Ellendon Street

Verge treatments: to be 2m wide concrete paths adjacent to the property line with grassed area extending to the kerb and incorporating street trees and bike racks at intervals along each side of street.

Seating/ artwork nodes: to be located adjacent to the path (see drawing) and to be feature-paved to distinguish them. These areas are appropriate places to display local or iconic artwork and information signage fixed to waist-high stone or timber plinths or as bronze plaques set in paving. Seats are to use local or iconic materials.

Street trees: existing trees in verge to be retained and additional trees planted to create a continuous canopy along street to provide shade and shelter for pedestrians and parked cars. Recommended species: Fraxinus Excelsior Westhops Glorie' (Ash Westhops Glorie).

3. GIBRALTAR STREET (Ref.: dsb drawing 3193-D3 B Gibraltar Street Streetscape)

Street function

Gibraltar Street at its western end is the main shopping street (supermarket, butcher, bakery, pubs) while its eastern end is the civic precinct (Anglican church, police station, post office, school and town park). Car parking and tree planting is in the centre of the street for its full length.

Streetscape design concept:

Design to facilitate slow speed vehicular access but also emphasise pedestrian safety, comfort and convenience, ie. a 'shared' pedestrian/ vehicular street i.e. village-market precinct.

Streetscape guidelines:



Street design & paving: Existing kerb lines and parking at kerbsides and centre of street to be retained, with a new pedestrian crossing west of Ellendon Street.

Verge treatments: to be full width brick paving (recommended colour: PGH Antique Chisholm) west of Butmaroo Street, 2m wide concrete paths between Butmaroo and Majara Streets with grassed area extending to the kerb. Bike racks and seating nodes to be incorporated at intervals along each side of street.

Seating nodes: to be located in verges (see drawing) and to be feature paved to distinguish them. These areas are appropriate places to display and information signage fixed to waist-high stone or timber plinths or as bronze plaques set in paving. Seats are to use local or iconic materials.

Street trees: existing trees in centre of street to be replaced with advanced 3-5m high trees at 10 to 15m spacing in min. $3m \times 3m$ pits with free draining soil connected to stormwater drainage system where possible. Recommended species: Platanus Digitata (Cut Leaf Plane Tree).

4. STREET FURNITURE (Ref.: dsb drawing 3193-D4 B Indicative Street Furniture)

This drawing shows a range of Public Artwork suitable for seating/ artwork nodes, seats, bike racks, information plinths/ plaques, street signage, bollards and street lights. Each precinct would have its own palette from the range.






