# Bushfire recovery and assistance

Many areas of Queanbeyan-Palerang have experienced a summer of bushfire, with homes, outbuildings, equipment and business income lost. Recent impact assessment figures show that there were 56 houses, 4 facilities and 148 outbuildings destroyed, along with 16 houses, 3 facilities and 51 outbuildings damaged in Queanbeyan-Palerang. There will be an ongoing recovery for many in our community.



The Australian Government and NSW Government have a number of measures to assist in the recovery. The NSW Government has established Service NSW as the point of call for bushfire assistance. Service NSW will guide affected people through the available assistance from all levels of government. Service NSW can be contacted on 13 77 88. On 20 January, we opened the Bushfire Recovery Centre in the Braidwood Meeting Room (Old Library) on Park Lane, with Council staff on hand to assist residents navigate through the various support measures in place. We made an initial donation of \$10,000 to the Braidwood Community Help Fund, which will be distributed to families affected by drought and bushfires and support the work of BlazeAid. Council also decided to cancel the fireworks that were planned for Australia Day celebrations in Queanbeyan and donated \$5,000 from this to the help fund. The Federal Government provided \$1m to councils to assist in bushfire recovery. This is being used to offset assistance measures such as waiving the hire fees of the Braidwood Showground for the duration of the BlazeAid operation, subsidising private works in relation to dam clearing, waste disposal, development application and inspection fees and rates rebates. Council has appointed a bushfire recovery coordinator, an economic development officer, and a community development officer to assist in the recovery, work with affected businesses, and build resilience in the community. This funding will also be used to fit out the recovery centre and for repairs to the Braidwood evacuation centre and recovery camp, and provide financial support to local wildlife recovery groups, with the balance held for infrastructure repairs.

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#### Queanbeyan River Walk extension



We've extended the Queanbeyan River Walk through the caravan park and have recently been working on extending the shared path on the other side of the river to the suspension bridge. This will mean there is a wide shared path, perfect for walking prams and riding bikes, all the way to the new shared path bridge near Morisset Street. We expect the caravan park to reopen under new management in April.

We will continue the river walk along the river, with a 350m section that includes a bridge over Barracks Creek planned for later in 2020.

**MESSAGE** FROM THE MAYOR, TIM OVERALL I'd like to give my sincere appreciation to all the fire fighters, volunteers, NSW Rural Fire Service and other emergency services along with the Council staff who worked so hard to protect lives and property over the summer. For many, this has been a stressful and fearful period. It has been heartening to see our strong and resilient communities coming together in my visits ground the region.

Local government elections will be held this year, on 12 September 2020. In QPRC, this election will include a referendum on whether QPRC should have a directly elected mayor, or a mayor who is elected by councillors. More information about this will be available as we move closer to the elections.













#### Road grading resumed



In early December, we suspended maintenance grading on many of our unsealed roads due to a lack of water. Grading a typical 1km section of road uses between 30,000 and 40,000 litres of water and the water wasn't available.

Council's graders and staff were then heavily involved in building containment lines as part of bushfire fighting efforts. Maintenance grading resumed in mid February, with rainfall topping up water supplies and fires extinguished or contained.

We are focusing on the roads that carry a higher volume of traffic and have been prioritised as requiring attention. # Mick Sherd Oval change rooms



The new change rooms at Mick Sherd Oval in Bungendore are complete and ready for the winter season. The new facility includes two large change rooms, six showers, four toilets, two strapping rooms and an all-abilities bathroom. This project was funded by the NSW Government under the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

The building was designed to complement the existing facilities building. This ties in well with the work we have done to restore the playing surface, with a new irrigation system installed last year and a lot of work done on the field over the summer.

# Let's get rid of illegal dumping

We are encouraging residents to report illegal dumping via RIDonline. Go to ridonline.epa.nsw.gov.au to make a report. If possible, take some photos of the dumped waste, and upload when making the report. Include as much information as possible especially on the location and description of the waste. If a vehicle was seen dumping items



record the registration plate number and the make of car as this information will assist Council in the investigation of the incident.

RIDonline is used by local councils and the NSW EPA to manage illegal dumping. Since its release in 2015, more than 40,000 cases have been reported.

Dumped waste can contaminate and degrade land, plant and animal habitats and pollute waterways. It can also pose a fire risk. Dumped waste can affect our health especially if it contains chemicals or asbestos and it makes public places unsightly.

Easily recycled resources, like whitegoods, mattresses, tyres and green waste are lost when they are dumped. Clean up is expensive and it undermines legitimate recycling, with resources diverted to deal with the issue.

Dumping waste on the kerbside or around charitable recyclers is illegal. Research from the NSW EPA shows that household waste makes up 47% of illegally dumped waste in NSW, followed by green waste, construction and demolition waste, and tyres.

Please contact Council for information on how you can legally dispose of waste. Illegal dumping will incur fines of at least \$4,000.

For emergency incidents such as toxic fumes or a large chemical spill, residents should call 000. For large urgent incidents, you can call the EPA Environment Line on 131 555.

# Rates harmonisation... have your say

We are required to harmonise the two former council rating structures that are currently in place. This will mean that one rating structure will apply across all of QPRC. As part of this process, we put together a Community Reference Panel to provide feedback and advice to Council in the development of the rating options.



The panel had representatives from around the Council area, as well as from different rating categories (business, farmland, residential). We held panel workshops and small groups to review and discuss the rate structure options.

The Community Reference Panel recommended a rate structure that was presented to Council at the February meeting. Now we want the community to have their say on the rate structure.

The development application and related documents are publicly available online and at Council's Queanbeyan customer service centre. Submissions are open until 17 March.




#### Zero to 100 program

#### Annual permits for restricted dogs and non-de-sexed cats

The grace period for annual permits for owners of nonde-sexed cats and dangerous or restricted dogs will end on 30 June. From 1 July, owners of cats that are not desexed by four months of age will have to pay an \$80 annual permit, while owners of dogs of restricted breed or declared dangerous will have to pay a \$195 annual permit.

The NSW Government has implemented these changes to create a stronger incentive to de-sex cats, improve health and wellbeing of pets, lower demand on animal facilities, reduce euthanasia rates, and help address concerns about feral, stray and roaming cats.
