Questions submitted by: John Covine

1. What do the red flags mean that were placed along the Burra Road S Bends before Christmas

Response – Community Connections

The orange flagging is the limit of works boundary. This is a mitigation measure from the Construction and Environmental Management Plan to mitigate damage to the existing environment from construction equipment movements.

2. When is the Qbn Council going to organise a meeting with the Burra Community to discuss the issues with the S Bends as no proper meeting or discussions have been held to date?

Response – Community Connections

Prior to amalgamation, the former Palerang Council held community meetings at Burra Hall to determine the community's priority for infrastructure project. Since amalgamation, the Burra's bends project formed part of Council's Delivery Program 2018-21 which was publicly exhibited in early 2018, prior to adoption in June 2018. The project itself has moved forward since the development of the Delivery Program and Council's Transport team has provided a copy of the plans and the draft Review of Environmental Factors to the Burra Landcare following requests at the Queanbeyan Community Meeting in May 2019. Moving forward, Council will be informing the community of progress of this project via our social media accounts, coverage in the weekly enewsletter and contributions to the Burra Intermittent.

3. 19-21 August this year will be the 200th anniversary of the days on which the first Europeans made an incursion into the Aboriginal lands that we now refer to as the QPRC LGA. To mark the occasion, I have prepared an article on the topic. It is being published in two parts: in the February and March issues of *The Whisper* (the monthly newsletter of the Wamboin Community Association). It is also available in full in the local history pages of the website of the Association: http://wamboincommunity.asn.au/localhistory/. A copy is attached. I wonder if Council has plans to mark the bicentenary in August? If so, I hope it would be done collaboratively with the local Aboriginal community, as clearly that event had very different meanings for the Aboriginal custodians of this land, and their descendants, than for the European explorers, and the non-Aboriginal people who now live in the QPRC LGA. One community member suggested that a fine first step might be

for Council to take action to change the official name of Lake George back to what it was called by the local people in 1820: Weereewa.
